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ABOUT US

History

Established in 1987, the Foundation is the state's only non-profit foundation statutorily created to provide scholarships, loan repayments and programs to health professional students and graduates throughout California who agree to practice in medically underserved areas. The Foundation, housed in the Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development, administers different programs targeting allied health, nurses, mental health providers, physicians and other healthcare professionals. Its outstanding track record of delivering healthcare providers to underserved areas of California has resulted in approximately 2,700 scholarship and loan repayment awards totaling over \$25 million to students and recent graduates practicing in 51 of California's 58 counties since December 1990.



A LIFE CHANGED: THE THERESA MORALES STORY



Theresa Morales always dreamed of contributing to her community by attaining a Master's Degree in Social Work. As a poor, working student at American River College, she could barely afford tuition and was forced to enroll in public assistance to make ends meet. Theresa's determination to end the cycle of poverty for her family led her to apply for the Foundation's Allied Healthcare Scholarship, for which she was awarded \$2,500 to complete her studies. Theresa Morales' ambition and hard work exemplify the very heart and mission of the Health Professions Education Foundation. She has gone on to provide direct patient care in a medically underserved area, and continues to serve her community as a professor of Gerontology at American River College.


A MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR OF OSHPD

2007 was the year California embarked on healthcare reform. With his January State of the State message, Governor Schwarzenegger announced an ongoing-effort to expand access to health insurance coverage for the almost 7 million Californians who are presently uninsured. Implicit in the concept that expansion of health insurance would increase the demand for healthcare services was the realization that California would need more health professionals, particularly to address the needs of today's underserved areas and populations. This is the role of the Health Professions Education Foundation: expanding access to care for the millions of underinsured and uninsured Californians who live in our state's medically underserved areas.

Despite all that California spends on healthcare, nearly 7 million Californians, or roughly 20% of the state's population, face challenges in obtaining health services as they reside in one of California's primary care health professions shortage areas. Access to quality care is further exacerbated by California's current and impending shortages across most healthcare occupations, the geographic mal-distribution of many health professionals, and variation in their degree of cultural competency.

Since 1990, the Foundation has successfully met its mission to improve access to healthcare in underserved areas. Thank you for your continued support in the Foundation and its mission of providing golden opportunities. I encourage you to continue to provide this support, and in turn, contribute to the solution of California's access to healthcare problem, one professional at a time.

On behalf of the Board of Trustees, it is my privilege to present the Health Professions Education Foundation's Annual Report for 2007.

Your generous support of the Foundation is most appreciated and allows the expansion of quality and equitable healthcare to California while serving the needs of our health professions students and workforce. I would like to share the 2006-2007 accomplishments of the Health Professions Education Foundation:

- Nearly \$2.4 million in grants were awarded through the Foundation's scholarships and loan repayment programs.
- Contribution and grant commitments supporting the Foundation totaled over \$3.1 million.
- 133 California health professional students and graduates representing 30 counties were awarded Foundation scholarships and loan repayment grants.
- Foundation staff attended 13 job fairs and community outreach events throughout California aimed at promoting our scholarship and loan repayment programs.

The Board of Trustees looks forward to continuing its support of health professions students and graduates who want to work in medically underserved areas. PROGRAMS

The Health Professions Education Foundation administers scholarship and loan repayment programs for aspiring healthcare providers. In return for financial support, recipients agree to practice in a medically underserved area in California for a period of one to three years.

Vocational Nurse Education Fund

These programs are funded through a surcharge on the biennial licensure renewals:

- Vocational Nurse Scholarships increase the number of vocational nurses via scholarships up to \$4,000 per year for two years of service.
- Licensed Vocational Nurse to Associate Degree Nursing Scholarships increase the number of licensed vocational nurses who pursue an associate degree in nursing via scholarships up to \$8,000 for two years of service.
- Licensed Vocational Nurse Loan Repayments increase the number of licensed vocational nurses via loan repayments up to \$6,000 for two years of service.

Registered Nurse Education Fund

These programs are funded through a surcharge on each Registered Nurse licensure renewal:

- Associate Degree Nursing Scholarships increase the number of nurses via scholarships up to \$8,000 per year.
- Bachelor of Science Nursing Scholarship and Loan Repayment programs increases the number of nurses working in medically underserved areas. Scholarships and loan repayments are available up to \$10,000 per academic year for a 2-year service commitment.

Mental Health Practitioner Education Fund

This program is funded through a surcharge on licensure renewals for Psychologists, Marriage and Family Therapists, and Licensed Clinical Social Workers to support:

- Licensed Mental Health Services Provider Education Program increase the number of licensed mental health providers available to practice and provide direct patient care in a publicly funded or public mental health facility, a non-profit private mental health facility, or in a mental health professions shortage area via loan repayments up to \$15,000 for two years of service.

Health Professions Education Fund

These programs are funded entirely through grants and contributions from public and private agencies, foundations, corporations, and individuals:

- Allied Healthcare Scholarships increase the number of trained allied healthcare professionals that practice direct patient care via scholarships up to \$4,500 per year.
- Health Professions Education Scholarships and Loan Repayments increase the number of Dentists, Dental Hygienists, Nurse Practitioners, Certified Nurse Midwives, and Physician Assistants via scholarships up to \$10,000 per year and loan repayments of up to \$20,000 for two years.

Medically Underserved Account for Physicians

This program is funded by voluntary physician contributions and private donations:

- Physician Loan Repayments increase the number of recently licensed physicians via loan repayments up to \$105,000 for three years of service.

OUR BENEFICIARIES

Our scholarship and loan repayment recipients are “gifts that keep on giving” in the communities they serve. For example, one primary care physician – whose loan is repaid by the Foundation – can have 8,000 direct patient visits per year. After three years, those physicians have encountered 24,000 patients throughout their service obligation. More than half of all award recipients stay in the community in which they fulfill their service obligation, contributing to improved access to healthcare in those underserved communities.

AWARDEES BY COUNTY OF RESIDENCE AND COUNTY OF EMPLOYMENT




■ Awardees by County of Residence
